Local teachers fundraise and bring supplies to Ukraine

Last May, Center Moriches social studies teacher, peer group leadership, varsity lacrosse, middle school football and varsity winter track coach, Chris Winslow, and another history teacher colleague, Chris Charvat, started a non-profit called NY4Ukraine.

The duo recently launched their website and Facebook page to help drive fundraising for the campaign. They made their first trip to the Ukraine over the summer of 2022, where they made a lot of great friends and contacts. During that trip, they visited with 17 bags of aid.

In addition to providing clean potable water filters and first-aid supplies to the 250,000 civilians in the city of Mykolaiv, NY4UKRAINE also assisted in providing essential combat supplies to the Mykolaiv Regional Guard. These supplies included body armor, camouflage clothing, and ballistic helmets.

"We feel very passionate about our support, and we are hoping to gain

Moriches Bay Deli is a community staple

Moriches Bay Deli is not only a great place to buy sandwiches like The Wrangler, featuring hot roast beef, cheddar cheese, and tangy barbecue sauce—on a roll, of course. It's also a great place to meet friends and be part of the community.

In fact, that's Roseann Gencarelli's favorite part of owning the deli, where joking around is a sign of affection.

"When you have fun, you can bust chops with your customers, and they can bust them back."

One such customer is Paul Sweeney, a lifelong resident of East Moriches and 26-year customer of Gencarelli's (the deli's been around for that long as of July 2022.) While Sweeney said he's a fan of all the deli's baked items, one item keeps him coming back.

"I like Ro's egg sandwiches," he said.

On a recent weekday morning, this reporter observed several egg sandwiches being made, but Gencarelli is most proud of another menu item: the Spooky Spider. In fact, as per the T-shirts, the deli is "home to the Spooky Spider." Picture a rustic baguette filled with honey maple turkey, crispy bacon, melted Swiss cheese, lettuce, and tomato, all drizzled with more of that tangy barbecue sauce.

In addition to customers like Sweeney, the deli is also an institution for neighborhood children to come in for a bite before and after class. It makes sense, as the deli is surrounded by schools, with the East Moriches Middle School and elementary school down the street.

"The kids come here every day," said Gencarelli of her youngest customers.

For Gencarelli, who is also president of Seatuck Grove Rotary and a member of the Moriches Chamber of Commerce's board of directors, the neighborhood children remind her of what



Dad and coach is local PAL president

Last year was Ali Adlah's first as the president of PAL CM Red Devils football, but he has been coaching since 2017, when his oldest daughter, Kaleesi, wanted to join the flag football team.

Kaleesi, now 10 years old and a student at East Moriches Middle School, currently plays on a youth PAL football team. Her team, the Center Moriches Red Devils Suffolk County Police Athletic League football team, recently won the Suffolk County PAL championship after completing an undefeated season, 8-0.

"I have been coaching flag football since 2017—she loves it. She is fast and great at it, too," her father Adlah said of Kaleesi, who plays defense and has since acquired nickname, Blitz. "That's what she loves to do—blitz."

Her sister, Myah, 8, an East Moriches Elementary School student, plays on a PAL youth football team, also with contact; and the youngest sister, Alia, is 4 years old and plays on the youth flag football team. Also, their 9-year-old brother, Mouhammad, played on the 8-year-old team as the captain and quarterback.

"Myah also loves the contact; she saw her brother play and wanted to join," Adlah said of his middle daughter. "She is the smallest one on the team, but goes after the ball intensely.'

How did they get involved in the sport? Adlah, a Port Jefferson native, said he played the sport in high school, but went on to become a pediatric occupational therapist. He practiced for 15 years before moving on to geriatrics, and at that point, missed being around children.

"So, I started coaching, and I found my passion. It just resonated with me that this is what I want to do," he said.

Athleticism runs in the family, with his wife, Melanie, who played for her college softball and volleyball teams at St. Joseph's University. Their children also play a number of sports, including Kaleesi and Myah, who play lacrosse and soccer; Mouhammad, who also plays soccer; and Kaleesi is also a brown belt in karate.

Though Adlah doesn't currently coach his daughters' teams, he coaches his



son's vouth team and is also the president of the PAL league in Center Moriches. The entire family is looking forward to next season, playing again in the PAL youth league. All the children will be on

separate teams due to their ages.

Last year, 2022, was the first year that flag football was offered as a girls varsity sport in Suffolk County (Section XI). Center Moriches was one of the first schools to participate. They had a dozen girls on the team.

The girls' sport is becoming increasingly popular, with The New York Jets and Nike sponsoring girls' teams across Long Island and New Jersey as of last spring. Nassau County schools that participated last year include Freeport, Hempstead, Locust Valley, Long Beach, Lynbrook, Massapequa, Plainview-Old Bethpage and West Hempstead. In Suffolk, there was Amityville, Center Moriches, Huntington Station, Longwood, North Babylon, Sachem East, Sachem North and Ward Melville. As of the new season, Suffolk County has

Their next trip back to the Ukraine will be in February. About 90 percent of their first trip was funded after being federally reorganized as a nonprofit. Rotary celebrates 85 years of service

Camp Paguatuck celebrates 75 years

The story of the Rotary Club of the Moriches and Camp Paquatuck starts in 1946, when a group of Moriches Rotarians came up with the idea to develop a special camp for special-needs children.

"This is an exciting time as we celebrate these amazing milestones for the Moriches Rotary, Camp Paquatuck, and the community," said Deborah Brown-Volkman, president of the club.

The camp originally began with a few kids sleeping in tents under the stars and has now evolved into a stateof-the-art facility for children with disabilities. It was named after the creek (Paquatuck Creek), which runs into the Moriches Bay. This creek became known as Kalers Pond in 1802. By 1960, the camp was extended to about 120 campers for two to four weeks, and in 1968 land was donated to the camp at no charge. In 1968, another 18 acres was purchased by the camp for \$9,000.

Every summer, approximately 450 to 500 children attend the camp. The camp is fully run from the generosity of other Rotary Clubs and service groups like the Lions, Kiwanis, Knights of Columbus, Camp and Paquatuck Squaws.

The current president of the rotary is Brown-Volkman, with Peter Traina as the vice president. Matt Crennan serves as treasurer and Dina Aponte as secretary. Other members include Elise Allen, Barbara Caldwell, Geraldine

"I have been a member for five years; it's been a great pleasure to be a part of the Rotary and the camp," said Sapanaro, noting she is one of the club's newer members.

The club started in 1937. Gus Stout Jr., a charter member of the Moriches Rotary, served as the president of the Board of Director of Camp PaQuaTuck till he passed in 1978. He was also president of Moriches Rotary from 1942 to '43. In 1972, the Camp Paquatuck Squaws organized and helped raised money for the camp. They are the prime fundraisers for the camp, even still creating events like the Spooky Walk. In December, they gave the camp a check for \$285,000.

Though COVID interrupted the operations of the camp for the past three years, they were able to offer an online program for campers. During this time, over \$2 million was spent to help upgrade the camp's cabins and

grounds. This summer, 2023, they can't wait to serve the children again with their motto, "Summer Is For Everyone." Their major project for the new year is to replace the in-ground pool.

Moriches Bagel Deli under new ownership

After 28 years of serving the Center Moriches community and beyond, Anthony and Carmen Dagostino, longtime owners and operators of Moriches Bagel Deli on Montauk Highway in Center Moriches, have turned in their aprons to spend time at their ranch in Texas, for some much-needed and well-deserved rest and relaxation.

A staple in the community for nearly three decades, the business was sold to Goldberg's Bagels, the family-owned-and-operated company that has been baking these round icons since 1949. Goldberg's Bagels officially took over on Friday, Jan. 13. The Center Moriches location joins a list of already successful stores in the Hamptons and on the North Fork.

Anthony purchased the bagel shop from Patty and Rich in Woodland in 1994. He was already operating bagel stores in nearby hamlets, but quickly fell in love with the tightknit community of Center Moriches. At that time, Moriches Bagel Deli was the only bagel shop in town, and one of the few places to get a cup of coffee, as 7-Eleven hadn't opened yet, said Anthony.

"It was truly a local deli where folks could meet and say hi," reflected Anthony on running the Bagel Deli in the early days.

Over the years, the Dagostinos would make changes to the deli that would include tweaking the menu, renovating the inside, and establishing their sister business, Moriches Catering. But one thing that remained a constant as the Bagel Deli evolved was the sense of place and community. It was a gathering place for area high school students to grab breakfast before school and a regular lunchtime spot for students with senior privileges, as well for the early-bird commuters and folks on their way to work.

Dave Kaloski, Center Moriches resident and owner and operator of Dockside Fabrics Inc., frequented the Bagel Deli at least three to four times a week for a medium coffee and a mini bagel. He appreciated the option of ordering a smaller-size bagel, but also the friendly

service that he always received from Carmen, who was a mainstay behind the counter.

"It was a nice way to start off your workday, "said Kaloski. "You always got service with a smile and good food."

Another Center Moriches resident, Jim Miller, had been a faithful customer at the Bagel Deli for years. A local bayman, Miller found himself going there in the wee hours of the morning before a day's work on Moriches Bay because the Bagel Deli was one of the only places open that early. "Plus, their bagels were much better than all the other bagel

stores around. Carmen and Anthony are good people, and I always like to do business with the townspeople... to keep it local," Miller added.

The Dagostinos admit that the decision to sell the bagel business didn't come lightly and was made before the COVID-19 pandemic hit in 2020.

We purchased a home in Texas in hopes of spending winters there, but once COVID happened, we were forced to stop working. At that time, we started to reflect on where we had been and where we were headed, and decided it was time to slow down."

Just as equally difficult was breaking the news to the dedicated employees and loyal patrons. Some of their workers had been at the Bagel Deli for years, including their chef Rich, baker Marcos, and store manager Idalia, who all worked at the Bagel Deli for 20 years; Becca, Carmen's "right hand," was there for 14

"These folks are family and deserve the credit for the success of the store," noted Anthony and Carmen.

Alex Berchin, another longtime employee, left his job at the IGHL Flower Barn to work at the Bagel Deli after seeing a Help Wanted sign in the window.

'With the help of Carmen and her staff, Alex was able to learn and experience a lot," said Alex's mother, Barbara Berchin. "He made great friends. Carmen always had his best interests in mind. Alex called her his second mother. Moriches Bagel Deli was a safe and happy place for him."

Owning a small business did have its ups and downs, said the Dagostinos, with many hurdles to jump.

"This business is 365 days a year; folks rely on you to be there for their morning routine. Now with prices going crazy, it was hard to make money and to get staff. The biggest obstacle of all is having some time to take off and relax."

But despite the challenges, Anthony and Carmen said they have enjoyed owning and operating Moriches Bagel Deli, noting that the best part of the job has been getting to know their customers.

We've watched the people of the community grow up," said Carmen. "We had customers that were kids when they first came into the deli, and now they are parents, and some are even grandparents. It's all about the relationships you build. We had kids that came home that would meet at the Bagel Deli, prior employees who have become Air Force pilots, police officers, teachers and executives, who all come back to say hello.'

Anthony added, "and the little kids who came in to see Carmen because they were excited to tell her about school or a gift they got. The most rewarding part of our business was the opportunity to be a part of all of the amazing people in our community." ■

Moriches is all about.

"They show respect. The other thing you like about this town is that the children—and I'm talking fifth through eighth graders—show respect. They come in, they order their food, they eat, and then they clean up after themselves. You don't find that everywhere," she said.

Some things have changed over the 26 years Gencarelli has served her customers at the deli. One of them is that she's now running the business alone. Her former business partner, Mary Ellen, is no longer involved in day-to-day operations.

"It's strange, after 26 years, but she'll still help me," said Gencarelli.

For example, she still makes the deli's famous signature M.E.G.'s classic vinaigrette dressing, a secret recipe. (M.E.G.'s stands for Mary Ellen Gerhard). She also comes in to make the rice pudding.

But many things have stayed the same, like the old community-minded vibes of East Moriches. Reliable in their hours, the deli is open from 4 a.m. to 5 p.m., except for Sunday, when they close at 4 p.m. They are closed on Christmas

Republican county executive candidate announced

Current county executive Steve Bellone is term limited and will leave office at the end of 2023. Early last year, the Democratic party announced former federal and state prosecutor Dave Calone as



their candidate. As of December 2022, the Republican party released their candidate as Center Moriches resident Pat Hahn.

"We are proud to officially announce our candidacy for Suffolk County executive," the press release reads. "Our candidate/committee are officially registered with the New York State Board of Elections in Albany, N.Y., running as a Republican candidate."

Hahn's platform is to keep Suffolk County safe, protect the environment, address the mental health drug problems of the area, and lower residents' taxes.

Hahn, 68, is a proud son of a WWII Navy veteran and was raised a Christian as a pro-life candidate. He is a lifelong New Yorker now living in Suffolk County. He has two older brothers and lost his older brother in 1986. Hahn previously ran for United States Senate.

He graduated from West Islip High School in 1973. After graduation, he worked as a truck driver delivery person for the local Pennysaver. In 1975, he began working at Pilgrim State Hospital in the Housekeeping Department. He later moved to a supervising position, and then took a civil service test and was hired to work inpatient direct care as a mental hygiene therapy aide.

During that time, he was active in the CSEA labor union. He was soon elected as the president of the Local 418 and was elected to CSEA Inc. Board of Director in Albany, representing Long Island. He was also active and elected to serve on the Human Rights committee, which later became the Affirmative Action committee at Pilgrim.

He then attended St. Joseph's and Suffolk Community colleges, as a night student part-time, taking specialized courses in psychology, early childhood development, fundamentals of management and labor union.

"I'm conservative-minded and consider myself a constitutionalist," he said. "I believe in what America was founded under as a Constitutional Republic. I support our freedoms, liberties, and rights under the U.S. Constitution as written by our founding fathers. I will always stand and respect our American flag. I fully respect and support all our military and law enforcement. I support law and order and equal justice applied for everyone fairly."

Hahn is married and retired; his wife works in direct care with special-needs people. Together they have a son, who is a registered nurse. Personally, Hahn is a longtime member of the Knights of Columbus, Ancient Order of Hibernians, and member of Long Island A.B.A.T.E.

"When elected, I will fight to restore transparency to our local government along with saving taxes—a county government that works for the people. I will answer to 'we the people,' not political parties or special interest groups," he promised if elected. "I will sponsor and support any bill for term limits. I will defend and protect all our constitutional rights, as written. I will strongly be advocating for federal funding for our county to establish long-term care facilities."

He also promised to fight for the military, law enforcement, small business, pro-life, the Second Amendment, freedom

RUNNING ON THE DEMOCRATIC LINE

Former federal and state prosecutor Dave Calone announced his candidacy last year to be the next Suffolk County executive running on the Democratic line. Calone lives in Setauket with his wife, a Presbyterian minister, and three children.

'I'm running for county executive to make sure that everyone benefits from the same kind of opportunities that I have enjoyed growing up and living in Suffolk County. I'm eager to get to work for the people of Suffolk, to enable everyone to have the chance to get a good-paying job, to protect our clean air and water, to help families afford to live here, and to create safe, thriving communities," said Calone.

Calone also created the Long Island Emerging Technologies Fund to help launch new companies based on innovations at Long Island's research institutions, and was the founding National Board chair of Patriot Boot Camp, a notfor-profit that helps veterans, active-duty service members, and military spouses to start small businesses.

Calone, a Democrat, has received the endorsement of RWDSU/UFCW Local 338, Iron Workers Local 361, IBEW Local 1049, and the New York State Iron Workers District Council. Also endorsing Calone at the start of the campaign are Long Island leaders: John Durso (president of RWD-SU/UFCW Local 338), New York State assemblyman Steve Englebright, Suffolk County Legislature minority leader Jason Richberg, Suffolk County Legis. Kara Hahn, Southampton Town councilmember John Bouvier, and Brookhaven Town councilmember Jonathan Kornreich.

Republican candidate Kevin LaValle wins Brookhaven Town Clerk

Republican candidate Kevin LaValle won over Democratic candidate Lisa Di Santo at 6,396 votes to 4,940 votes, respectively, according to brookhavenrepublicans.com in the special election to replace Brookhaven town clerk Donna Lent.

LaValle and Di Santo both vied head-to-head in a special election on Tuesday, Jan. 17 to replace retired town clerk Donna Lent.

Both LaValle, 45, of Selden, and Di Santo, 58, of East Patchogue, were chosen by their respective parties to continue the last three years of Lent's term. LaValle, who was endorsed by Brookhaven Conservatives, proved victorious in a contentious race.

A member of the Independence Party, Lent, 70, retired on Nov. 10, following a nine-year tenure in office, which coincided with her plans to relocate out of state.

Special election voting to replace Lent started

with early voting from Jan. 7 to 15, with voting coming to its conclusion on Tuesday.

LaValle, a mortgage loan officer, the ostensible winner of the election, has one year remaining in his four-year council term. His stated objective was to abdicate his town board seat if he proved victorious over Di Santo

William Ferraro, co-chair of the Central Brookhaven Democratic Club, and erstwhile candidate for Brookhaven supervisor, said, "Lisa, against all odds, just pulled off the best performance of any Brookhaven Democratic townwide candidate in the last decade, against the most powerful Republican political machine in New York State. That's a testament to her hard work as a candidate, the relentlessness of our volunteers, and a superior organizing strategy executed by a Democratic Committee that will not give up the fight," he said at around 11 p.m. on Tuesday night, when Di Santo was hovering around 48 percent in the polls, which closed at 9 p.m.



At approximately 10 p.m. on election night, Di Santo took the time to thank all those who supported her with about 2,500 doors knocked on, thousands of calls made, and more than 1,300 voters obtained, mostly through canvassing. In addition, volunteers robocalled about 10,000 voters, texted 6,000 voters, and put out hundreds of lawn signs declaring their support for the underdog candidate during the firedup five-week campaign.

"I am grateful and humbled by the tremendous outpouring of support I have received from voters across Brookhaven Town," she said of the hot-ticket

Mastic-Moriches-Shirley Community Library opens new branch

Former Mastic Beach Village Hall transformed

The Mastics-Moriches-Shirley Community Library opened a new, 7,000-squarefoot Satellite Branch Library at 369 Neighborhood Road, in Mastic Beach, at a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Saturday,

Attended by local officials and members of the community, the opening of the new satellite branch represents a milestone in an overall, multi-project expansion of library services for patrons of the Mastics-Moriches-Shirley Community Library district by helping to offer a streamlined and convenient library experience for residents district-wide.

The new satellite branch library—situated within a short walk or bicycle ride for residents in the densely populated southern part of the library district—is expected to play a catalytic role in the revitalization of the Mastic Beach business district and to bring increased levels of foot traffic to businesses along Neighborhood Road.

'For decades, library patrons in the Mastic Beach area had expressed concern that our main library building in Shirley was located beyond reasonable geographic reach for significant portions of our community," said library director Kerri Rosalia. "This new Neighborhood Road branch will significantly help residents obtain the library services they want and

"The entire library staff deserves enormous credit for bringing this beautiful, new facility into existence." said library board president Joseph Maiorana. "Our team is particularly excited about having the opportunity to help boost the economic vibrancy of the Mastic Beach area."

Last year, Maiorana was appointed to the Suffolk County Downtown Revitalization Panel by Third District Legis. James F.

A library district-wide expansion and modernization program had been set in motion by local voters on Dec. 10, 2019 through passage of a \$22.7-million bond referendum. At the time of the referendum's approval, the district's sole library—situated at 407 William Floyd Parkway in Shirley—was 28 percent smaller than the recommended library size for a community with the district's population.

Underscoring the absence of adequate space, attendance at popular programs had to be limited due to lack of capacity. Moreover, the library had been forced to conduct hundreds of classes and meetings at off-site locations every year, which had proven to be costly, staff-intensive, and logistically cumbersome.

In addition to the creation of the newly opened satellite branch, the referendum's passage set the stage for two additional enhancements in library services that, for the first time, would bring quality library services within close geographical reach for all residents of the community.

First, in addition to the new Mastic Beach facility, the district is erecting a new, 7,000-square-foot Moriches Satellite Branch on Montauk Highway, a construction project nearing completion. And second, the outdated main library in Shirley is closed for a period of technological modernization and renovations that would bring it into code compliance. Once the newly upgraded Main Library opens, the two new branches in Mastic Beach and Moriches will remain in permanent

Currently, main library services have been temporarily relocated to the Town of Brookhaven's Mastic Recreation Center at 15 Herkimer Street in Mastic. "The Town of Brookhaven is proud to be providing the district with a place to offer temporary library services to the public at the Mastic Recreation Center," said Brookhaven Town supervisor Ed Romaine. "In addition, we are delighted about the role that the Mastic Beach Satellite Branch is certain to play in the revitalization of the local community.'

said Mazzarella. "I applaud the trustees and staff of the Mastics-Moriches-Shirley Community Library for an achievement that will benefit Mastic Beach for a great many years to come."

Designed by H2M architects + engineers of Melville, the modern, new library in Mastic Beach represents the expansion and adaptive reuse of the community's former village hall, a 4,000-squarefoot structure. The new facility's colonial-style exterior is compatible with the architectural style of the surrounding community.

With an abundance of natural light streaming throughout the building, the library's flexible space includes dedicated areas for children, teens, and adults. It also features an outdoor area for children- and family-oriented programming. To complement the branch's ample inventory of books and audio-visual material, items requested from the inter-library loan network are available for pickup.

The library design team emphasized cost-efficiency in its selection of building materials and structural elements. The ventilation system, for example, is energy-efficient. The overall site also promotes sustainability by adhering to LEED standards set forth by the U.S. Green Building Council.

In addition, directly across the street

from the new Neighborhood Road facility, the library has secured a 30-year lease for a parcel of county land at the nominal cost of \$10 a year. The lot will be upgraded for outdoor community programs and such activities as seasonal outdoor performances, concerts, children's offerings, and other programming.

Construction work at the Mastic Beach site was undertaken through a competitive bidding process. The selected contractors were all based on Long Island. Sandpebble Builders of Southampton served as construction manager.

About the Mastics-Moriches-Shirley Community Library

The Mastics-Moriches-Shirley Community Library was established by the voters of the William Floyd School District in the summer of 1974. It opened to the public in June 1975, when it was located in two small, portable classrooms on the William Floyd School District property. Since 1982, it has been one of Suffolk County's most utilized libraries, occupying a 44,000 square foot building on William Floyd Parkway in Shirley. Since its inception, the library has been a leader in providing innovative services that include automation; children's and family programming; services for teens and seniors; cultural activities; literacy services; community outreach initiatives; digital services and technology support; career and college readiness assistance; lifelong learning opportunities; and partnerships with local businesses and community organizations. The recipient of numerous grants in support of its unique programs and services, the library has been recognized in such major media as Newsday, the New York Times, NBC's Channel 4, and News 12. Smith Point Bridge Replacement Project awareness

Info session held at William Floyd High School

The Smith Point Bridge Replacement Project held a Construction Awareness Information Session on Wednesday, Jan. 18 at 7 p.m., in the William Floyd High School auditorium, located at 240 Mastic Beach Road, in Mastic Beach. The public meeting was hosted by a panel including Suffolk County executive Steve Bellone, Suffolk County Legis. James Mazzarella, commissioner of Suffolk County Department of Public Works Joseph Brown, P.E., and representatives from project consultant, Hardesty & Hanover (H&H). After the presentation, there was a Q&A session where those in attendance were invited to voice their questions and con-

The meeting was held to help build a with the community to discuss Suffolk County's Department of Public Works (SCDPW) plan to replace the more than 60-year-old Smith Point Bridge with a new high-level fixed bridge, built to the west of the existing bridge. It was explained that adjacent construction would maintain continuous vehicular and pedestrian access to Smith Point County Park and Fire Island. The existing bridge will then be demolished upon completion of the new bridge. It will feature amenities for the community to enjoy, such as a pedestrian path and a fishing pier. The cost is set to come to \$112 million.

One of the most salient reasons for this meeting was to explain to residents why it's so important to replace the existing bridge, despite the cost, and to assure them there would be minimal inconvenience during the duration of construc-

"It is really one of the lowest-rated bridges in the county. It's one of the worst conditioned bridges in Suffolk County, and just from the photos alone you can see the amount of deterioration that's out there," said Brown during the presentation, which showed slides of the current bridge, as well as demonstrated plans for the new one.

Those in attendance learned that the plan requires a high bridge, which is west of the existing drawbridge in Shirley, connecting William Floyd Parkway to the local favorite spot, Smith Point County Park. Construction for the bridge is notable as the county's largest infrastructure project, not including sewer and wastewater systems. The project, which is expected to be completed in 2027, will begin in mid-2024.

It was made clear that this major

construction project will not impede residents' use of the existing bridge. "It's a very important bridge for access, for recreational purposes, and really for the whole section of the Barrier Island. It's right next to Smith Point Marina, which is a facility with a boat launch that those from the community know is a great way to bring a boat into the bay, and we're going to keep that open during the construction as well. Some of our contractors might be working in that area, as it's an area that we hope to use for loading work vessels and so on, but it is an area that's going to be kept open to the public," Brown said.

The project will now cost significantly more than was estimated, in 2021, which was \$75 million at the time, due to increasing construction costs, which have risen dramatically for such a short span. The addition of the 12-foot-wide pedestrian path will also add onto the total cost.

One of the biggest concerns for many residents was how travel and recreation would be affected during construction, so it was important to inform that construction could occur while the existing bridge is still in good enough condition to be used safely.

"The beauty of that is that by building alongside the existing bridge, we can put traffic onto the new bridge before demolishing the old one, which means traffic keeps going the whole time. At the end of the project, the existing bridge is going to be demolished. It's going to be removed to free up that area where the footprint of the old bridge is—not only to restore the environment and footprint underneath the bridge, but also to create an area for the Parks Department to have a new recreational facility that's in the footprint of the old bridge," Brown explained.

About \$90 million in federal funding is expected to go towards construction. While this is a sizeable cost, it certainly appears to be necessary. The Smith Point Bridge is one of the nine Long Island spans with a "poor" rating given by the state Department of Transportation. While a "Poor" rating doesn't mean a bridge is unsafe to traverse, or at risk for a catastrophic collapse, it is indicative that it is likely to require more careful monitoring, and at more frequent intervals, as well as needing additional maintenance and repairs going forward. The bridge has already had a weight limit applied to it by the county to ensure safety due to deficiencies detected.

IRS rules on the Suffolk County Septic Improvement Program

On December 2, 2022, the Internal Revenue Service issued an announcement providing an update on the taxability of grants. The Announcement 2022-26 can be found at the following website: https://www.irs.gov/pub/ irs-drop/a-22-26.pdf. Taxpayers should be informed that pursuant to the Announcement, IRS has determined that payments made by Suffolk County under the Septic Improvement Program are not to be included in the grant awardee's gross income.

Grant Awardees who may have already reported the grant payments as gross income on their 2019, 2020 or 2021 Federal income tax return may file an amended return with Form 1040 X for the year(s) in which they reported the income, and decrease their adjusted gross income by the appropriate amount, or consult your tax advisor. The Explanation of Changes on Form 1040-X should refer to "Announcement 2022-26." Form 1040 X can be found at the following website: https://www.irs.

gov/forms-pubs/about-form-1040x.

The IRS's announcement comes after the Natural Resources Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture provided public notice on November 16, 2022 that in response to a request filed by the Suffolk County Commissioner of Health, the Secretary of Agriculture issued a determination that payments under the SIP Program are primarily for the purpose of conserving soil and water resources and protecting or restoring the environment,

therefore meeting the requirements of § 126(b)(1)(A) of the Internal Revenue Code to be excluded. See Determination of the Primary Purpose of the New York Suffolk County Septic Improvement Program (SIP), 87 FR 68669 (Nov. 16, 2022).




