An astonishing anniversary for a beautiful community

Presbyterian Church of the Moriches celebrates 275 years BY NICOLE FUENTES

It's not every day your hometown church turns 275. In celebration of this monumental event, the Presbyterian Church of the Moriches community will be hosting several events throughout the year.

Proud of the church's longevity, anniversary committee member Nancy Horton anticipates the year ahead. Horton is, notably, not the oldest, but one of the longest members of the church, having been baptized there as a baby 76 years ago. Her parents were married here, as were she and her husband, Richard.

"I love the church. I've been here my whole life and it's just such a part of my life, it's like breathing, it's just what I do," Horton said, admiring her time with the church.

Of the many things to love about the church, she said, is one of their most prized possessions: the original organ, which was restored in 1978 and played by a baby grand piano. The members are also proud of the newly renovated kitchen adorned by original wood floors, which helps make one of most successful Mother's Day tea fundraisers possible. This year will mark the 25th anniversary for the tea as well.

About 10 years ago, the church's first female minister, Jeannine M. Frenzel, arrived. She has since moved on to Pennsylvania in 2020. Currently, the church has an interim minister, Rev. Mark Applewhite. The church also has ruling elders, about a dozen deacons, and a session with about half a dozen voting See **CHURCH** on page 4



Annual St. Patrick's Day parade comes to town

We've all heard the saying, "Erin go bragh," but what does it actually mean? In the Irish language, or Gaelic, "Erin go bragh" is roughly translated as "Ireland Forever" or "Ireland 'till the end of time." Judging by this translation, Moriches has lots of Irish pride, evident in the many

The day was cool, but bearable. Main Street was packed as marchers and spectators alike, dressed in green and donning shamrocks, displayed Irish pride and Moriches pride, too. Ireland's famous flag, three equal blocks of green, white, and orange, could be seen waving in many a spectator's hand.

Seatuck Cove Rotary hosts largest yet "This is the most in all the years we'v tor Ruben Reyes sta

The Seatuck Cove Rotary Club reported that their annual 4-Leaf Clover 5K Run drew in more participants on March 18 this year than in the past.

"We had over 150 [people running]," Rotary Club district governor Wendy Walsh-DeMaria said.

The 4-Leaf Clover 5K Run/Walk for Charity raises funds for various local high school scholarships given to students attending Eastport-South Manor, Center Moriches, and Westhampton high schools. Multiple members of the Seatuck Cove Rotary Club said that this year's marathon had the highest number of attendees yet, with around 158 runners. The club hopes that the increased number of participants is an indicator that the event will expand and prosper further, thus raising even more money for students.

4-Leaf Clover 5K Run "This is the most runners we've ever had United States Naval Sea Cadet Corps,

in all the years we've done this," race director Ruben Reyes stated at the event.

This year's 4-Leaf Clover Run was the sixth iteration of the event, hosted by the Seatuck Cove Rotary Club. The marathon is a key early event in their charity scheduling, as the results of the run impact the club's ability to help students and influence future projects.

"So far, every year we [held the marathon, except the first year of the COVID-19 pandemic], have been able to give out five \$1,000 scholarships," Rotary Club member Roseann Gencarelli said. "Any money above that, after our expenses, [is] put in the bank to start saving for our next project."

Participants started at East Moriches Middle School on Adelaide Avenue, traveled to the East Moriches Sea Cadet and Coast Guard base, and returned to the middle school. Runners either jogged alone or as part of a team, and their times were tracked by employees from EliteFeats.com. The Theodore Roosevelt Division of the

United States Naval Sea Cadet Corps, commanded by Lt. Kenneth Roberts, helped participants follow the marathon's route and handed out refreshing supplies, like bottles of water, to runners at certain points on the path.

"We've done this run a few times," Roberts said.

Runners in the marathon could also win honorary awards, depending on how quickly they finished the course. Winners were spread across multiple categories, with some people winning medals for being the fastest runner in their age group and gender. The first person to finish the event overall received his own separate award. Sergey Avramenko took first place with a running time of 16 minutes and 23.16 seconds.

"I feel happy," Avramenko declared, after Reyes placed a medal around his neck at the finish line. "I'm getting back in shape. Good result."

The Rotary Club works to make sure they can raise awareness of the 4-Leaf Clover Run as much as possible. Before the

event, the club reaches out to a plethora of local businesses and the Moriches Chamber of Commerce in order to advertise the event.

"I help as much as I ca—getting sponsors, getting participants, [et cetera]," Rotary Club vice president Joyce Duck explained.

The organization also holds other charity projects and fundraisers in addition to the run. Rotary Club members help distribute baskets during Thanksgiving, donate backpacks to young students, and collect a variety of used objects—from worn-out sneakers to broken eyeglasses—ffor recycling initiatives that use the resources to help suffering individuals internationally.

The Seatuck Rotary Club intends on holding another 4-Leaf Clover Run next year, and they hope to have even more runners then and surpass this year's numbers. "I would love to have 200 [runners],"

Gencarellli said. "My hope is that it will grow to, at least

one day, [have] at least a thousand runners," Reyes added.

members. Their services are held every Sunday at 10:30 to 11:30 a.m.

One of the church's most important community outreaches is their food pantry. The pantry, which serves up to 50 families per week, is open on Monday evenings and staffed by church members and local volunteers.

"I believe our church is one of the most beautiful, iconic buildings in our lovely town of Center Moriches... The steeple can be seen from out on the sea, and the current building has been an established part of Main Street

since 1886."

LINDA DAVIS, Choir member and Deacon

Choir member and deacon Linda Davis has also been a longtime member and joined in 1998. She has been the director of the children's choir and served on the Board of Trustees. She currently serves as the co-director of the food pantry with Dawn Murray. "This is our third decade of serving our neighbors in need in our community, and we have a terrific group of dedicated volunteers who are there every Monday," she explained. "We serve over 5,000 families a year and offer clothing, bedding, toys, kitchenware, pet food, as well as food to our clients every week. Everyone involved with the food pantry-volunteers, donors, recipients—share our common humanity and the need to take care of our brothers and sisters, every week."

Bill Phillips, chairperson of this anniversary committee and elder, joined the church about 12 years ago with his wife.

"We attended a few Sundays and it inspired friendship, acceptance, and a place of peace and caring," he said of the atmosphere. "My experiences since that first Sunday have been a positive one, which have affected many corners of my life."

Since then, he has become the coordinator for the upkeep of the church and joined as the chair of the 275th anniversary committee.

"I am happy to welcome the community to celebrate with us," he added. "Our church has been an icon in the community for 275 years and hopes to continue for many generations to come."

THE HISTORY OF THE CHURCH

The church was founded in 1748, reorganized in 1831, incorporated in 1839 and had the first edifice in 1809, second in 1839 and enlarged in 1861, rebuilt in 1886 and had a Sunday school extension in 1931. The church has had over 20 ministers, including their first female minister in 2010.

The first recorded church documents date back to Oct. 20, 1748. The minister at that time was Rev. Nehamiah Greenman, a graduate of Yale Divinity School. He was a circuit rider, a horse-riding preacher with a Bible in a saddlebag. He covered the South Shore from Quogue to South Haven, then known as Fire Place. At that time, services were held in peo-



ple's homes.

The first building of the church was erected in 1809 at the site of their present edifice at 263 Main Street in Center Moriches. By the mid-1800s, Center Moriches had about 600 residents, two churches, four stores, two hotels, a blacksmith shop, a grist mill, a boat builder, and a few tradesmen. Most residents earned their living from the soil or the bay.

The church has since become a landmark building and has been enlarged many times since its inception, most recently in 1986 for their education/food pantry wing.

CELEBRATION EVENTS

The first event will be held on April 16 at 2 p.m. with a piano/organ concert by Michele Garzo, concert pianist. The concert is \$20. The second event will be the annual Mother's Day Tea, a threecourse Victorian tea on May 13. Then, the church will host a community celebration on Sept. 23 with an open house, including food and fun at no charge. ■



Simply fill out the form on the library's website and choose up to five packets of seeds. Then, you will receive a mailing from the library with seeds to plant in your garden. Slips are also available at the library. And, no, you don't need to return the seeds! However, they do love to see photos from local library member's success.

WHAT KIND OF SEEDS ARE THERE?

As for herbs, there are basil, mint and thyme, to name just a few. For veggies, there are options for cauliflower, zucchini, and squash, and for flowers there are options for marigolds and sunflowers. For a complete list of options, visit the drop-down menu in Selections on the library website.





CM teachers bring supplies to Ukraine

NY4Ukraine takes second trip

Center Moriches social studies teacher, peer group leadership, varsity lacrosse, middle school football and varsity winter track coach, Chris Winslow, and another history teacher colleague, Craig Charvat, recently returned from their second trip to Ukraine in February.

Despite a few bumps in the road, Winslow, a former United States Marine, said the trip was extremely successful. They traveled with a five-man team that included himself and Charvat; two retired military pilots and a retired United Airlines pilots, John Yackus and Rob Zettel; and Aaron Messina, a former U.S. Marine.

The bumps, he mentioned, included a canceled flight on Lufthansa airline on Feb. 24, due to a strike. They were rescheduled to fly on Finnair the next day. Then, upon checking into Finnair with all the documentation that showed they were a legitimate 501(c)3 and that Lufthansa was flying their 31 bags (1,550 pounds) for free as part of their humanitarian aid policy, Finnair refused to accept it and charged them \$5,000 to bring the aid. They arrived in Krakow, Poland, on Feb. 25 and spent the night in a hotel. On Monday morning, they then had a driver and a van pick them up and drive them to Przemysl, Poland, where they delivered seven bags (350 pounds) to the Hope Foundation refugee center. They provided winter clothing, wool hats, socks, art supplies and sporting goods (soccer balls, basketballs, etc.). The team then traveled to the Mydeka, Poland, border crossing



Roman and his wife, son, and daughter-in-law. Roman helped them donate at the Mercy House orphanage. They brought supplies to the children in the camps to help create art, which will then be sent back to Long Island and used for fundraising.

into Ukraine.

"At this point, the border guards would not allow our driver, who was Ukrainian, to drive into the country because the van was rented in Poland," Winslow said of another snag. "Thankfully, after six hours, a Ukrainian soldier who was returning to Ukraine overheard our situation and sent his wife to get their van, and he drove us with all the aid to Lviv."

Running behind schedule, they missed a train to Rivne, Ukraine, where they were supposed to meet Roman, a commander in the Territorial Guard, to deliver seven more bags of combat support gear. This gear included tourniquets, medical supplies, camouflage uniforms, and handmade ghillie suits for their snipers and drones. Instead, they arrived in Rivne at 11 p.m. that night, after securing a driver for the three-hour drive. Roman had traveled that same day 13 hours to Rivne to meet them.

On Feb. 21, they then went to the Mercy House orphanage, run by the Eastern Catholic Garrison Church. There, they delivered winter clothing, art supplies, and sports equipment to Roman for the 250 orphans in their organization. That night, they met with Maria, who runs a humanitarian aid organization in Lviv, and delivered her four duffel bags of winter clothing and children's clothing.

"We became friends with her on our last trip and also gave her one duffel bag with clothing just for her two sons," Winslow added. "Her husband is a soldier in the Territorial Guard."

By Feb. 22, their translators, Ostap and Bohdanna (both Ph.D. professors at the Lviv National Academy of Arts), took the team to the Institute of Cultural Strategies, which is a government-run organization. The organization provides art and music therapy for refugees throughout the country.

"We delivered the rest of our art supplies, which will be sent out to Eastern cities in Ukraine," he said.

On Feb. 23, Ostap took Winslow to a refugee shelter at Ternopilska 8, in Lviv, which was located in a Soviet-era apartment building. There, he delivered the last three duffel bags of children's clothing and winter hats. And by Feb. 24, the entire team took the train from Lviv to Przemysl and exited Ukraine.

"We needed to get out of the country before the one-year anniversary of the war, Feb. 24, because there was much anticipation of a massive offensive and rocket attacks throughout the country," he explained.

Last year, the duo started the nonprofit NY4Ukraine and launched their website and Facebook page to help drive fundraising for the campaign. They made their first trip to the Ukraine over the summer of 2022, where they made a lot of great friends and contacts. During that trip, they visited with 17 bags of aid.

In addition to providing clean potable water filters and first-aid supplies to the 250,000 civilians in the city of Mykolaiv, NY4Ukraine also assisted in providing essential combat supplies to the Mykolaiv Regional Guard. These supplies included body armor, camouflage clothing, and ballistic helmets.



Town recognizes Miriam Gillies

Every year, the Brookhaven Town Division of Women's Services honors outstanding women of Brookhaven. This year, the town celebrated its 37th annual Women's Recognition event during Women's History Month, with a special celebration held in March. Among the many women honored, supervisor Ed Romaine and deputy supervisor Dan Panico honored Center Moriches resident Miriam Gillies.

Gillies brought the Relay for Life to Center Moriches, which raised thousands of dollars in order to help cancer research. She also spent tireless hours for many years organizing, planning, and reaching out to survivors.

As a charter member of the Passport Rotary Club, she's participated in educating people about organ donation, food drives, and delivering food and basic necessities to the working homeless that live in Suffolk County.

Gillies has also been a member of the Moriches Chamber of Commerce for many years as an integral participant in almost every event.

She started her community volunteerism during the annual Blessing of the Fleet in the late '70s and started the first Offshore Women's Fishing Tournament. She also participated in Camp Paquatuck's Bike-A-Thon for years and the chamber's annual Duck Race. She is also known for taking cancer patients back and forth to treatment. During the years, she has also volunteered for the Moriches Bay Unit of ACS and participated in Daffodil Days, Jail and Bail, Help Soccer Kick Cancer, and the Amazing Kite Fly.

But the most rewarding event, she said, is the Relay for Life and being an active volunteer at East End Hospice.

Additionally, she has been on different programs/committees at the local school, judge for the fire department's holiday parade, and presently, she is on the Board of Directors of Chamber of Commerce of the Moriches, Moriches Community Center, and Our Lady Queen of the Apostles. She is also a parishioner at St Johns R.C. Church.

Several years ago, she also restarted the chamber's Halloween window painting, and chaired the Student of the Month, menorah and tree lighting, and the Veterans Day parade. The chamber also honored her as the first female grand marshal for the annual St. Patrick's Day parade in 2011.

Bringing safe water to area impacted by PFAS

Community meeting held

Officials from the Suffolk County Water Authority, Town of Brookhaven, Town of Riverhead and the Suffolk County Department of Health Services convened at a community meeting and provided an update on projects to bring safe drinking water to two areas of Manorville, where private wells have been impacted by PFAS contamination.

At the meeting, officials said the various sources of grant funding had been secured to pursue the projects, one in the Town of Brookhaven and one in the Town of Riverhead. In both cases, the water main will be extended to the impacted communities, each of which has 64 homes.

Tests on private wells in the area have detected various contaminants, with some levels exceeding state and federal drinking water standards. The perfluorinated compounds PFOS and PFOA—regulated by New York State last summer at 10 parts per trillion are among the contaminants detected.

"The Suffolk County Water Authority is ready to begin this important project to bring safe and constantly tested drinking water to neighborhoods in the Manorville area impacted by PFAS contamination," said Suffolk County Water Authority board chairman Patrick Halpin. "Those who take advantage of this opportunity will be receiving the resources and high-quality water of one of the most respected public water suppliers in the country."

Brookhaven supervisor Ed Romaine said, "Most residents take clean drinking water for granted, but as some Manorville residents have experienced, that is not always the case with their groundwater. This project will finally provide safe and clean water that we have come to expect from the Suffolk County Water Authority. I am happy that quality-tested water is in the near future for the Manorville community."

"On behalf of the town supervisor, all members of the town board and its departments, we are very pleased to have support from senators Schumer and Gillibrand, congressman La Lota, New York State Department of Health, and our state representatives, [with] an award of \$3.815 million for Manorville Extension 94 and an award of \$1.185 for Forge Road project. The town is and will continue to focus on addressing the protection of public health through clean, potable water. The town's focus on public health is demonstrated by its continued efforts for funding and the success in 2021, 2022, and just days ago. Sometime ago, the town entered into an agreement with SCWA with the goal to provide clean drinking water to Extension 94 as expeditiously as possible, and we are anxious for work to begin for these

residents," said Devon Higgins, deputy supervisor, Town of Riverhead.

New York State Sen. Anthony Palumbo said, "Providing clean, reliable, and safe drinking water to the residents of Suffolk County remains one of my top priorities, and I am extremely happy that this critical project is moving forward for residents throughout the Manorville area. Today's announcement is the result of vears of hard work and the determination of residents, town supervisors Romaine and Aguiar, the Suffolk County Water Authority, and our state and federal representatives. This project is a prime example of what can be accomplished when government works together for the betterment of residents.'

"The Suffolk County Department of Health Services supports connections to public water systems whenever possible to ensure that residents have access to a regulated water supply," said Dr. Gregson Pigott, Suffolk County commissioner of Health Services. "The department is pleased to work with our partners in state and local government in the ongoing effort to advance these projects."

"Everyone should have access to clean drinking water. Often times, the regrettable stories of unsafe drinking water will conjure an image of an underdeveloped country," shared Brookhaven town councilman Dan Panico. "However, we must recognize that we have domestic challenges with regard to contamination linked to the aftereffects of products and processes that have ceased many decades ago. The partnership between the Town of Brookhaven and the Suffolk County Water Authority will address the issue of contamination in private wells to help our residents achieve clean, safe public drinking water."

"It's been four long years for the Manorville community waiting for clean, safe drinking water. In the last four years, the drinking water standard for PFAS has gone from a federal advisory goal of 70 ppt, to a state drinking water standard of 10 ppt, and now a new proposed federal standard of four ppt. Homeowners with private wells need assistance to obtain public water that is tested and filtered when needed. We are appreciative of the all the levels of government and the Suffolk County Water Authority, who are working together to help protect the health and safety of this community," said Adrienne Esposito, executive director of Citizens Campaign for the Environment.

"The Manorville community is anxious for this project to begin," said area resident Kelly McClinchy. "We are appreciative of all the effort that has led to this point on our behalf. We look forward to being able to turn on our taps and know for sure that we have clean, safe water."
