'Off-Bottom' Oyster seeding

On July 7, Brookhaven Town supervisor Ed Romaine and deputy supervisor Dan Panico were at the Moriches Yacht Club for the Moriches Bay Project's 11th Oyster "Off-Bottom" seeding event. During this event, small oysters are placed in plastic, porous cages and suspended off the bottom of the bay. This protects the oysters from predators and allows them to significantly grow before being released. Founded by Westhampton residents Laura Fabrizio and Aram Terchunian, the Moriches Bay Project works to improve the water quality in Moriches Bay through oyster farming and education. Since being established in 2012, the group has planted more than two million oysters in the bay and made numerous educational presentations at local schools. After more than a decade, the Moriches Bay Project remains committed to "saving the bay, one oyster at a time." 

East End Hospice cares

Q&A with president and CEO

East End Hospice offers more than the basics of end-of-life care, with services including home hospice care and facility hospice care at their Kanas Center, and bereavement and children's bereavement with a dedicated center, both located in West Hampton Beach, as well as health care services and volunteering opportunities.

East End Hospice is Eastern Long Island's only independent, not-for-profit hospice, where charitable donations sustain their work. Insurance covers about 80 percent of the cost of caring for their patients; however, they accept all patients regardless of insurance status, and no patient or family ever receives a bill for care.

What happens when a person is

When a person is admitted to hospice at home, EEH develops an individualized plan of care for the patient and their loved ones, managed by an interdisciplinary team of health care professionals including social workers, nurses, hospice aides, volunteers, chaplains, and others.

All medical care is provided under the direction of the patient's primary physician or the EEH medical director, depending on the patient's preference. Care might include: medications and medical equipment, such as oxygen and hospital beds, delivered to the home; personal care, such as bathing, dressing, and feeding, performed by hospice aides; visits by nurses and nurse practitioners, who are available 24/7 to educate caregivers about their loved one's day-to-day needs; emotional support and help with practical matters, like insurance benefits and final arrangements, from licensed social workers; alternative therapies such as massage and healing touch; visits from volunteers to offer socialization and caregiver respite; and spiritual guid-



ance and pastoral care.

"Families tell me all the time that our Kanas Center for Hospice Care is unlike any medical facility they've been to previously," said Mary C. Crosby, president and CEO. "From the beautiful surroundings and calming interior spaces to the singular and specialized focus of our staff, we consider every aspect to ensure that our patients and their loved ones are supported physically, emotionally, and spiritually.

Crosby took the time to chat with the Tide of Moriches to answer the following questions:

TIDE: How long has EEH been around?

MC: East End Hospice has been providing hospice care for more than 30 years. Originally conceived by a dedicated group of friends and neighbors in the



late 1980s, EEH received hospice certification in 1991.

TIDE: What makes it special? What do you offer that sets your establishment apart?

MC: EEH is Eastern Long Island's only independent not-for-profit hospice. Our 98.5-plus average caregiver satisfaction is testament to the quality of care we provide. We serve families across more than 450 square miles at our Kanas Center—the only inpatient hospice in the area. Our Zinberg Family Bereavement Center offers specialized grief and bereavement support from licensed therapists. Our services are free of charge.

TIDE: Why is hospice care important, and how do you help families through this time?

MC: The specialized training that hospice nurses, aides, social workers, staff and volunteers bring to this work brings a level of support that benefits patients and their loved ones. Every patient's plan of care encompasses the goals and needs of the extended family unit, not just the patient. We support everyone, and continue supporting family and friends with check-in calls and grief and bereavement support for as long as needed after the death of a loved one.

TIDE: What is Camp Good Grief? How long have you been offering that service?

MC: Camp Good Grief was established in 1997. We combine traditional camp fun with a variety of therapeutic modalities to help children, ages 4 to 17, process and adapt to the loss of a loved one. Camp happens here in Center Moriches at Camp Pa-Qua-Tuck. We have a great partnership with the camp.

TIDE: How has EEH been able to become part of the community? Do your employees live nearby?

MC: EEH was conceived of by local community members, many of whose children and grandchildren are still involved today. We have more than 150 local volunteers, and many of our donors at all levels live right here in the community. Our staff live in the area, too. EEH employees live in towns across the North and South forks; several are current residents of or grew up in the Moriches.

Annual Veteran Fishing Trip

Great Gun Moriches Anglers host fourth fishing trip for veterans

The Great Gun Moriches Anglers hosted their fourth annual Take a Vet Fishing event at the Union Avenue dock on Saturday, July 22.

"We like giving back to the community," Great Gun Moriches Anglers member Evan Goldstein said. "A lot of worthwhile people served our country.'

Active and retired veterans were invited to board boats and spend the morning fishing in local waters. Participants in the event congregated at the Union Avenue dock at 8 a.m., received bait for the day's fishing, and were assigned to boats. Fishing boats returned to the dock at 3 p.m. for a barbecue. The Great Gun Moriches Anglers use the event as a means of expressing their gratitude for the United States armed forces.

"[The event] was my brainchild," Goldstein said. "I saw them doing it in Florida; I brought it up to my club, and we've been doing it ever since."

"Our outing is a small way for us to thank our current and past veterans for their service and sacrifice," Great Gun Moriches Anglers member Tim Markart

Members of the Great Gun Moriches Anglers worked together to provide supplies and coordinate the fishing trip. Bait and barbecue supplies were provided by some members, while other members were responsible for registering veterans, assigning veterans to boats, and selling T-shirts promoting the club. Some club members even volunteered their own boats for the event.

"We come down, we set everything up, we get [the veterans] on the boats and we get them bait," Great Gun Moriches Anglers member James Tolson said.

The Great Gun Moriches Anglers reached out to veterans' organizations in order to promote the Take a Vet Fishing event. The club contacted Veterans of

Foreign Wars Post 414, a local veterans' organization operating out of its own meeting hall on Main Street in Center Moriches. The club also posted flyers in local bait and tackle shops.

"This year, we [had] veterans coming in from as far as North Carolina for the event," Markart said.

Boats sailed into Moriches Bay and surrounding waters from the Union Avenue dock at 8 a.m. and spent the next seven hours fishing. Past angler events had fished for fluke, sea bass, porgies, bluefish and striped bass. Participants Greg Menegio and Rocco DeVito caught species such as fluke, sea robins, bluefish and bunker. DeVito is a Navy veteran who previously participated in military operations in the Middle East, such as Desert Storm.

"I caught a [bluefish]... and a black fluke and a bunker," DeVito said.

"I like fishing and I like... just being part of the local fishing community, Menegio said. "We find the fish by [using sonar], by the splashing [of fish near the surface], and by the birds [congregating

near the fish]."

The 3 p.m. barbecue at the Union Avenue dock marked the conclusion of the event. Great Gun Moriches Anglers members served chicken wings, burgers, and hot dogs to the returning participants. Members of the fishing club estimate that around 45 veterans participated in this year's fishing trip.

"This is probably one of the best events that anybody could [have]; it's free for veterans and lets them know the American people [respect them]," Tolson said.

"Our hope is that... we are able to grow the event to support any and all veterans in the Greater Moriches area," Markart

The Great Gun Moriches Anglers previously hosted a shark fishing tournament on June 24, where a thresher shark weighing 275 pounds was caught and displayed. The club will be hosting a fluke tournament on Aug. 5. The tournament will also be hosted at the Union Avenue dock and will last from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m. ■

Helping Makes U Happy hosts a carnival for a good cause

Fundraiser for child abuse awareness

Last month, on July 15, Helping Makes U Happy held a carnival to help promote child abuse awareness/prevention.

"After the tragedy which occurred several years ago in our community, and more recently learning of another local case of alleged child abuse, it was very important to Keith to bring the communities together in a happy, helping way," said Keith Caputo's mother and co-founder Cassy Caputo, referencing the Thomas Valva case.

On Jan. 17, 2020, Thomas Valva died after authorities said his father, Michael Valva, and his fiancée, Angela Pollina, forced him and his brother to sleep in an unheated garage overnight as the outside temperature fell to 19 degrees.

According to Keith, his intent was to raise funds for the Child Advocacy Center EAC-Network and bring information to community members as well as teachers and administrators as to how to recognize and help abused children.

"We were very fortunate in that WPIX11 news morning show invited us in to speak about the carnival and also News 12 promoted it, and ultimately we ended up having over 300 people attend," said Cassy of the attendance and sup-

The event was a very family-friendly, affordable carnival. There were carnival games, face painting, a basket auction, small-business vendors, the Suffolk County Sheriff's Office with medical IDs, 7th Precinct COPE officers, the Center Moriches Library, a Girl Scout troop with an activity table, a magician, balloon twister, a DJ, and a touch-a-truck. There were also food trucks, which donated back to the cause.

'So many people told us how much they and their families enjoyed it!" added Cassy. "It really was a community event in every sense of the word—so many organizations and businesses participated and sponsored and donated back to the cause."

The event raised about \$4,000 for the Child Advocacy Center EAC-Network. The Suffolk County Child Advocacy Center reduces the trauma of child sexual/ physical abuse or neglect and promotes the coordinated prosecution of offenders.

MLB pitcher graduate of CM High School

Q&A with Paul Gibson

Paul Gibson graduated from Center Moriches High School in 1979 and was a Major League Baseball pitcher for eight seasons with the Detroit Tigers, 1988-1991; the New York Mets, 1992 and 1993; and the New York Yankees, 1993, 1994 and 1996. After eight years as an MLB southpaw, Gibson coached Center Moriches baseball, winning two Long Island championships.

He also ran the facility called Paul Gibson's All Pro Sports Academy in Bellport for many years subsequent to his playing career. In 2006, Gibson started his career as a scout for the Atlanta Braves, then worked as a scout for the Seattle Mariners, and in 2010 was hired by the Kansas City Royals as a national scout supervisor and currently is the Royals senior director of pitching performance.

Q&A:

Tide: You spent nine years playing Minor League Baseball before finally being called up to the big leagues with the Tigers in 1988. Talk a bit about what made you decide to keep playing because I know it can be a tedious and frustrating process waiting to finally get called up to The Show and a lot of guys just give up after a few years.

Gibson: Yeah, probably most of the credit goes to my wife for pushing me along and giving me the will to not have to go away into the real world and look for a job back then. I was a high school draft and I was still pretty young in terms of my career, but there were plen-

ty of points along the way where it was frustrating for me because I was either not having success or was having success and not being able to take advantage of those opportunities, but the last couple years of my minor league career I started to put things together, where an opportunity with Detroit presented itself and I made the team and was fortunate enough to hang on for a while as a swing man-type role lefthanded starter of some type of lefthanded reliever, so I'm glad that I hung on. It was not an easy trail, for sure.

Tide: Playing with the Tigers, your manager was the great Sparky Anderson, some of your teammates were Hall of Famer Allan Trammell, Hall of Famer Jack Morris, Lou Whitaker, Fred Lynn, Ray Knight. Talk about being a rookie and getting to play with those legends.

Gibson: First of all, Trammel and Morris are still two very good friends of mine. I was fortunate enough to be invited to their Hall of Fame induction a few years back and the things that you learn from people along the way, just about how to present yourself as a big-league player or big-league person, those guys certainly played a major role in that for me, so all great people that you mentioned and many more, but quite an honor to get to Detroit play for Sparky and then be with those guys for four years.

Tide: How was it to play for both the Yankees and the Mets?

Gibson: Great question. Obviously, a distinct honor to play for both of your hometown teams. Not always the easiest. There were difficult times in there, which also come a lot with playing for your hometown team because

as we know the Mets' and the Yankees' fans are very passionate people and the expectations, especially my first year with the Mets, were very high, a lot of investment in a team to win, and it didn't happen, we had some injuries and we didn't play well, nobody really performed consistently and it ended up being a really tough time for the organization. And the Yankees, I mean, for anybody to be able to put on those pinstripes for any period of time is an incredible experience, and I'm grateful to be one of not a whole lot of guys in the Major Leagues to be able to play for both.

Tide: Talk about Center Moriches baseball. The program obviously has had so much success for a long time.

Gibson: I started with the junior high team and then the varsity job opened up and they asked me to do that. It was great to be able to give back to the community and coach so many really great kids. A lot of them to this day I'll stay in touch, and now they all have their own kids and it was an awesome experience, so yeah, I got out of the game but I staved in the game. In my life it's one of the great opportunities that I had to get on the field and be able to be a part some of the things that I learned along the way from great coaches and managersteach kids how to play the game and teach them how to become young men.

Center Moriches is a small community with a lot of really great people and a community that supports all sports there, and it had always been a place where kids played two or three sports because of the size of the school and the amount of people in each class. We averaged 100 to 115 students in each grade when I went to Center Moriches; we had tremendous youth programs from ages 8 and up.

The Little League program has always been very strong, so to be able

to get these guys to commit to play two or three sports at that time was not very hard to do-they just wanted to do something, so that's the fabric of that community is the youth programs and all the programs. It's a unique place because they play at a high level with not a lot of players to pull from, so athletes and families and parents that are committed to giving their kids the best opportunity is really what makes all those programs go at the high school level—keeping them on the field, keeping their grades up. Just a great place to raise a kid and have an opportunity to play sports. Just can't say enough about all of those people in the community.

Tide: The championship season for the Royals in 2015, the Royals beat the Mets. So, it was against the hometown team. Also, Steven Matz (Ward Melville) was on the Mets that year and in the ALCS Marcus Stroman (Pat-Med) was on the Blue Jays. Can you talk about some of those local correlations during the 2015 playoffs?

Gibson: It was really interesting because in 2015 I was part of the advanced scouting team, and what that means is we would follow certain clubs around that were potential playoff opponents, so I spent a good amount of September that year watching the Blue Jays and Marcus. I have experience with both Marcus and Steven from All Pro Sports the Academy, and I know their families very well. It was an exciting time to be a part of that World Series team, but most importantly, it sort of brought everything full circle to watch those young guvs compete against us, both in the playoffs and the World Series. [I have] a lot of fond memories of those moments, and I follow both those guys to this day and stay in touch with their families. But that World Series ring that I possess from 2015 is one of my biggest treasures. ■

Teams included an all-girls, all-boys, and coed teams. Adlah also started a Superstar League for children with special needs and was able to integrate the players on the teams.

East End Athletics Inc. is now an established nonprofit sports charity organization. It was founded in January 2023, hoping to provide opportunities for children of all ages and abilities, including children with special needs. The Superstar League, which is a free league, was created for athletes with special needs and also gives everyone an opportunity to play organized sports.

Adlah is also an occupational therapist, who has been practicing for over 20 years. His dream was to bring a different perspective to coaching, given his extensive training and practice in kinesiology.

This season, East End Athletics continues to bring the flag life experience to the East End of Long Island.

"Flag is still seen as nothing more than a recreational sport; however, outside of New York, flag football is life to many young and adult athletes," said Adlah of the sport.

According to Adlah, EEA, which is now officially an NFL Flag Football League and affiliated with USA football, has learned that there are so many teams and leagues out there, playing pro and semi-pro flag football all over the country and world. Now, there are international leagues and domestic leagues that play year-round.

"The NFL has more recently taken more interest in flag football, especially at the girl varsity level in local school districts," Adlah said. "I feel by the year 2025, flag football will be the most popular sport, passing lacrosse and soccer."

Flag football, according to Adlah, allows players of all skill levels to have an even playing field and allow those players who feel "mediocre" to shine.

"I feel that with the help of NFL Flag, we could help pave the way for other organizations to start up flag football leagues and help grow this sport on Long Island," he added.

EEA has successfully completed its first official season this past spring, and though he was only expecting 15 to 20 players to start the league, once registration was done, they had over 80 players signed up, including an all-girls team.

Now, the league has begun their summer league, where the focus is more on national tournaments. And, with the help of coach Brian Cunningham, the league is proud to say they have competed in their first official tournament at the UConn Cup, on July 15.

"We did not do as well as we had hoped; however, all the players and coaches came out of that tournament with a much greater desire to train harder and play in more tournaments," Adlah said. "Needless to say, we learned so much from this experience and opportunity, learning that some of these teams have been playing flag together for years, and it shows.'

EEA, he said, will continue to practice on any field they are able to use. Adlah said the league continues their search to find and build a separate sports complex for flag football and all-girls sports.

Last month, Adlah attended the annual NFL Flag Football summit in Atlanta. Ga., a four-day conference, hoping to network and connect with other league organizers.

The league also continues to look for sponsors who will give children opportunities to play, regardless of their financial background. Current Platinum Level sponsors include Joe Colucci from East End Sign Design and Chris Barletta from Sand and Pebble construction management. Their sons, Jason Colucci and Jacob Barletta, are both on the EEA national travel team and both participated in the first tournament.

"We are always grateful to have sponsors at any level to assist with sponsorships for the opportunity to have every child play," he said.

Other contributors include Adla Team real estate, Love Solar, Green Office solutions, Shirley Feed, East End Financial, The Artists Nest, Westhampton Plumbing and Heating Supply, Alicia's Day Care, Neat and Complete Barbershop, and Bagels and Brunch. Each sponsor was able to provide a player with an opportunity to play and afford uniforms, flags, and other equipment needed to play in EEA's flag football organization.

'We have faced many trials and tribulations; however, we continue to fight and push forward," Adlah continued. "We want to work with all local organizations to build programs together, giving every child an opportunity to play in an NFL-sanctioned league. As the founder and owner of EEA, I am so proud of how far we have come in a short period of time and excited to see how far we can grow." ■




